About Our School

St Herbert's CE Primary and Nursery School is situated in Keswick and is the result of the amalgamation in April 2015 of Trinity Junior School and St Kentigern's Infant School. As a voluntary aided school, it maintains close links with the parish churches and values its Christian ethos, but it is open to children of all denominations.

There are currently ten classes within school: two classes in Early Years (Latrigg and Walla Crag), three classes in Key Stage One (Catbells, Barrow and Lord's Seat) and five classes in Key Stage 2 (Bleaberry, Fleetwith Pike, Skiddaw, Helvellyn and Scafell Pike).

Teachers meet weekly to plan the curriculum for each phase. This ensures that children in each phase follow the same curriculum even though they are in different classes.

The topics are planned in two-yearly cycles, one for each half term. Topic information is available on our website under 'Curriculum'.

We are blessed with an amazing location, with the Lake District fells as our backdrop. Our extensive grounds include separate infant and junior playgrounds, each with their own play equipment, as well as an outdoor classroom area for Early Years. We have a large playing field for use by all age groups. In addition, we have a climbing wall, two gardens for children to grow flowers and vegetables, a wild woodland area, a stone circle seating area (within a wild meadow) and a small amphitheatre, so that we can take learning outdoors at every opportunity.

Admissions

As St Herbert's CE Primary and Nursery School is a Voluntary Aided school, the Governors are the Admissions Authority for the school.

The school's published admission number is 50. Should there be more applications for places than the school has available, these will be allocated in accordance with the current criteria, which can be viewed below. These are listed in order of priority:

1. Children who are in Public Care or who have been adopted (or became subject to a child arrangements order or special guardianship order) but were formerly in Public Care. This also includes children who were previously in Public Care outside of England. A child in public care is defined as a child who is looked after by the Local Authority within the meaning of section 22 of the Children's Act 1989.
2. Children who have physical and/or medical needs who would be disadvantaged by travelling to another school. Written evidence from an appropriate professional would be required for the Governors to consider admission in this category.
3. Children living within the catchment area having a brother or sister attending our school at the time of their admission giving priority, if necessary, to those children with the youngest siblings. Brothers and sisters are those living at the same address including step, adopted and foster children.
4. Other children living in the catchment area, giving priority to those living closest to the school measured by the shortest walking route by road from the centre of the pupil's home address to the front entrance of the school. The Governors will use the Local Authority's computerised Geographical Information System (GIS) to ensure consistency of measurement. The closest addresses will have priority.
5. Children living outside the catchment area who, at the time of their admission, have brothers or sisters in the school, giving priority, if necessary, to those children with the youngest siblings. Brothers and sisters are those living at the same address including step, adopted and foster children.

Applications should be submitted online through Cumbria County Council's Citizen Portal or using form SA1, available from Cumbria County Council School Admissions or the school office.

A guidance booklet about starting school in Cumbria has been produced by Cumbria County Council and is available to download from the School Admissions website or to view at the school office.

Please note that attendance at our Nursery Class does not guarantee entrance into Reception and a separate application must be made at the appropriate time.

Induction

For children joining Reception, once you receive your offer of a place at St Herbert's CE Primary and Nursery School, you will receive an invitation to a meeting in the Summer term to find out more about our induction into school. You will meet the Headteacher and your child's new teacher and will be able to ask questions you may have. You will also be given a welcome booklet that will give you more information about our school.

Later in the summer term, there will also be an opportunity for your child to spend some time in their new classroom to meet the teachers and make some new friends.



Before your child starts Reception in September, **or** when they start Nursery, the class teacher will make an appointment to visit you and your child at home. This is an informal meeting when you can get to know the members of staff in whose care your child will be and talk to them in privacy about anything relating to starting school.

At the meeting, we will share starting information and discuss with yourselves how we manage this.

If you have any concerns or worries please speak to us. We will listen!

Transition

We take children from a wide variety of pre-school providers and we contact all of them to start to get to know your child.

We have excellent transition arrangements in place to ensure the children move throughout the school happily.

After year 6, most of our children move to Keswick School. We have excellent transition arrangements in place and we often welcome children back to see us, for example, for work experience.

Our School Day

The school doors are opened at 8.45am each morning.

Please note that children are **NOT** supervised on the playground by school staff before school starts.

Morning session

9.00am to 12 noon

Afternoon session

1.00pm to 3.20pm

At home time the teacher will bring the children to the doors for each class. Your child will be asked to remain in the classroom if you are delayed for any reason.

Various clubs are held in school throughout the year. These change from time to time, but last year included running club, dodgeball, netball and reception Christmas craft club.



A Healthy School

The government provides every child in school with a free piece of fruit each day. The children can have access to water bottles throughout the day. Milk can be purchased via Cool Milk, but is currently free to under fives and children who are eligible for free school meals (not universal infant free school meals).

School meals are produced by our school cooks. If your child prefers a packed lunch, you may opt to provide this, however, we would be grateful if you don't send sweets, fizzy drinks or chocolate in packed lunches, as we are keen to promote healthy lifestyles for our children.

Free School Meals are currently available to all infant Children, however, if you are in receipt of benefits, your child may also be eligible for uniform grants and pupil premium funding and this must be applied for. Please ask the office for more details.



Uniform

All our children wear school uniform, as we believe the wearing of uniform helps the children take a pride in themselves and their school.

Our uniform comprises a sweatshirt or cardigan embroidered with the school logo and name. Both are available from our uniform stockist - Identity. Please visit www.oneidentity.co.uk to register and order. Plain red cardigans are not acceptable.

Children should also wear a white polo shirt. White polo shirts with the school logo are also available from Identity, but plain white polo shirts are acceptable and are readily available from a variety of shops.

In addition, girls should wear black trousers, skirts or knee length culottes - not 'leggings' style stretchy trousers. In summer, girls may instead wear dark red gingham dresses or the more recent playsuit - as illustrated above. Boys should wear black trousers or shorts.

For boys and girls, shoes - not boots or sports shoes - should be black with black, white or grey socks or tights - not red or other coloured tights. In winter, children may wear boots to walk to school, but should bring black shoes to change into on arrival at school.

Clothing grants to spend on school uniform are available for children who are eligible for free school meals. To apply for free school meals and a clothing grant, please visit the Cumbria County Council 'Apply for Free School Meals' page.

Parents are asked to ensure that their children are dressed appropriately and that their clothing bears the name of the child.

P.E. Kit

Children also need a separate PE kit, which should comprise black or white shorts, white tee-shirt and plimsolls or trainers. They can also wear a plain, dark tracksuit in colder weather if they choose.

Jewellery

The wearing of jewellery is not permitted for reasons of safety. A simple pair of stud earrings and a watch with the child's name on are the only exceptions. If parents wish to allow children to have their ears pierced, they are advised that it would be very helpful to have this done at the beginning of a summer holiday period, as we ask children to remove them for PE. If earrings cannot be removed due to the healing process, children will be asked to cover their earrings with micropore tape or a plaster.

Teaching and Learning

Early years unit

Nursery and Reception are part of the Early Years Foundation Stage for children from birth to five years old. Teachers plan activities and experiences that are carefully matched to the children's needs and stages of development.

Learning in the Early Years Foundation Stage Curriculum takes place around the following seven areas:

Communication and language

Physical development

Personal, social and emotional development

Literacy

Mathematics

Understanding the world

Expressive arts and design

Play, both indoors and out, is an essential part of development and learning. Children learn best by doing things they really enjoy, so our skilled staff plan learning activities that are play-based, active and fun. Staff are skilled in providing the right balance of challenge and support to take the children forward whilst maintaining their confidence.

The children are encouraged to take responsibility from an early stage. Children from all year groups join our School Council and are involved in decision making.

We have excellent transition arrangements in place to support the children as they move up through the school.



Teaching and Learning

Key Stage One

At St Herbert's , we know that confidence is a key to success and we work hard to boost our children in this area. Children are better able to fulfil their potential when their emotional health and well-being are promoted and these aspects are very important.

Teaching Methods

In Years 1 and 2 we teach according to the National Curriculum for Key Stage 1. To find out more about what areas are covered and how we assess the children, please visit our website.

We are also required to teach Religious Education and, as a Church of England School, we follow the syllabus provided by the Blackburn Diocese and 'Understanding Christianity'.

Here at St Herbert's, we use a variety of methods and schemes to teach children and help them progress, including Read Write Inc. to teach our children how to read and write. Read Write Inc. is a whole school programme with children being grouped across the school and all taught Literacy at the same time each day. For further information about the programme, please speak to a member of staff.

Special Educational Needs

On average, about 20% of children need special help at some time with their schooling. Needs are identified in several ways: information is gathered from parents, pre-school groups, outside agencies, teacher observations or assessments. Children with needs identified will be supported appropriately. An Individual Education Plan (IEP) may be drawn up and support will be given in the classroom, or small groups as appropriate.

If you have any concerns about your child, please speak to us—we are approachable and will take your concerns seriously. Our SEN Policy and details of our local offer are available from our website or the school office.



Partnerships with Parents

Home-School Partnership

We are proud to work with our parents to maximise the opportunities we offer the children.

We know that children are not always forthcoming about school, so we provide other opportunities for parents to find out more about life in school. We have a fabulous Facebook page that posts regularly about our activities and a weekly newsletter.



Attendance

It is vital that your child attends school regularly, unless they are ill. Please telephone us on the first day of absence. We politely request that you don't book holidays in term-time as your child may miss vital aspects of his or her education. Holidays in term-time are only authorised in exceptional circumstances. An unauthorised absence will stay on your child's school record throughout their school life. Our school attendance target is 96.5%.

Homework

Homework can be hugely helpful but we also appreciate that, after a long day at school, children may not feel like it! Reading and sharing books with your child is encouraged daily for pupils across school. Books will be available for children to access once they are ready to start reading, either through Oxford Owl or sent home in their book bags.

In Key Stage one, children will receive a book to take home in their book bag, as well as a Read, Write, Inc book that can be accessed via Oxford Owl. In addition to these, spellings will be set on Spelling Shed and maths games will be sent home to play.

In Key Stage two, maths and English homework will be sent weekly via Seesaw, with children also asked to log on to their Spelling Shed and TT Rockstars accounts as often as they are able to during the week.

Helping in School

Many parents help out in school and we welcome this. If you can't help regularly you might be able to help on trips, or to talk to the children about the work you do.



Parent Teacher Association (FOSH—Friends of St Herbert's)

If you feel able to help with any events organised, we would be very grateful. PTA events have helped to raise funds to improve the environment for all the children.

Parental Concerns

Although we have a formal complaints procedure (which can be viewed on our website), we ask that if you have any worries or concerns please call in to see us. We are friendly and approachable and have the interests of the children at the forefront of all we do.
